Background

Against the larger backdrop of evolving market demands, changing stakeholder expectations, and heightened investigative journalism, ESG (Environmental, Social, and Governance) issues have gained persistent prominence on corporate agendas in recent years.

Notably, ESG factors have assumed exceptional significance in supply chain management. Companies now face the imperative of evaluating their suppliers' ESG practices to ensure alignment with their established principles and criteria. This evaluation encompasses verifying the adoption of ecologically sustainable materials and methods, promoting equitable treatment of employees, and upholding principled business conduct.

However, despite the growing importance of these factors, significant improvements across various economic sectors remain elusive. Furthermore, these processes, which rely on voluntary standards, do not provide legal certainty for either companies or victims in the event of harm.

For these reasons, governments and regulatory bodies have begun to shift their approach from relying solely on voluntary standards to enacting concrete legislation in order to support companies in their endeavor to perform due diligence in their value chains and foster business conduct that respects human rights, children's rights and the environment. A noteworthy example of this shift can be seen in France (2017) and Germany (2021), where horizontal due diligence laws have been introduced. Additionally, several other European Union member states, including Belgium, the Netherlands, Luxembourg, and Sweden, have plans to follow suit in the near future.

At the same time, however, these emerging frameworks also bring fragmentation and risk undermining legal certainty and a level playing field for companies. In light of this, and as a further step towards sustainable business under uniform European conditions, the European Union is preparing to introduce the *Corporate Sustainability Due Diligence Directive*. If adopted, the directive will require in-scope companies to undertake due diligence on their own activities and that of their suppliers, and to identify and prevent, end or mitigate any actual or potential adverse impacts of their activities on human rights and on the environment.

Crucially, this overarching development, accompanied by all its pressure for adjustment, comes at a time when transformative megatrends – growing great power conflicts, geopolitical pulls, and a receding and reshaping globalization – manifest in critical supply disruptions, escalating trade tensions, the imposition of tariffs between major economies, and the resort to nationalist and mercantilist economic policies such as localization and

friend-shoring. It is in this context that an increasing number of Western companies are already using value chain due diligence as a tool to build resilience to sudden changes.

Corporate compliance in Asia – a key manufacturing and supply chain hub – will change accordingly, as companies in the region must embrace ESG-related compliance standards. However, while especially major European companies have already begun are soon to adopt ESG-centric compliance standards, numerous Asian counterparts find themselves far from ready to meet these new and forthcoming benchmarks.

The 2023 edition of CPG's annual conference combines two long-standing focal points of CPG's work – ESG and compliance – to illuminate the status, challenges, and opportunities of ESG-related supply chain due diligence in Asia through a comprehensive exploration of the following key themes:

- The Emerging ESG Landscape and its Challenges: Understanding the evolving ESG paradigm, its global significance, and how geopolitical considerations influence and challenge its implementation.
- The Human Rights and Environmental Realities in Asian Supply Chains: Delving into the actual state of human rights and environmental practices within Asian supply chains.
- The Impact of ESG Supply Chain Standards and Regulations on Investment and Business in Asia: Analyzing how ESG supply chain standards influence investment decisions and overall business strategies.
- Implementing ESG Supply Chain Standards and Regulations: Discussing specific challenges and strategies related to ensuring that organizations adhere to ESG standards and regulations within their supply chains.
- Potentials and Challenges for Collective Action and Multi-Stakeholder
 Frameworks: Discussing the possibilities and obstacles associated with collaborative efforts and frameworks involving multiple stakeholders.
- Third-Party Certification and Standardization: Examining the role of third-party certification and standardization in ensuring ESG compliance.
- The Future of ESG in Asian Supply Chains: Forecasting the trajectory and evolution of ESG considerations within Asian supply chains.
